

DEFORESTATION

Deforestation is the removal of an area of trees or a forest that is then converted and used for non-forest use.

Did you know that over 42 million trees are cut down every day, meaning that over 15 billion trees are being cut down annually. This is no laughing matter, and if we don't put a stop to this we could lose the existence of trees forever.

From 2001 to 2019, a total of 386 million hectares of forest were lost globally (in all forest types combined). This loss represents an almost 10% decrease in tree cover since 2000.

Our rainforests are rapidly disappearing and, if we don't stop and help, there will be no rainforests left. In 2019, 11.9 million hectares of tropical forest was lost. Primary rainforest made up nearly a third of that loss (3.8 million hectares). Rainforests play an important role in keeping our planet healthy, as the trees covering the land absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen, stabilising the Earth's climate. Also, according to the US National Cancer Institute, over two-thirds of medicines that were found to have cancer-fighting properties originally came from rainforest plants. Keeping the rainforests healthy and full of nature is a necessity.

Deforestation doesn't just affect us humans but it affects animals as well. Over 30 types of different species live in the rainforests. If we don't stop deforestation, all of these animals will lose their homes and there will be no-one to blame apart from ourselves. They will go extinct if we don't help them.

Are you just going to stand around and let this happen?! Are you just going to let the animals you love only live in zoos and not in their natural habitats?!

All animals should have the right to live in their own natural environment and not just live in zoos.

We should all help to stop deforestation because it is awful, and it is harming animals and humans.

CARS IN CITIES AND TOWNS

In July of 2021, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced that, as part of his 'Ten Point Plan for a green industrial revolution', the sale of new petrol and diesel cars and vans will be stopped by 2030, with all new cars and vans being completely zero-emission from 2035 onwards. While it is understandable to be concerned about the current climate crisis, it could be beneficial to our economy if this plan was reconsidered.

If all petrol and diesel cars are banned in cities and towns, it would vastly decrease the available means of transport, leaving people to either buy a new car, use public transport, or physically travel on foot/wheels, however this is not considerate of many minorities who reside in these places. Some people may not be able to afford a new car that abides by Boris Johnson's 'Ten Point Plan', and some people may not be able to afford public transport. A single bus journey will cost around £2 – to put this in perspective, let us say you have to get the bus to and from work 5 days a week, that is already £20 weekly. If you work for 50 weeks in a year, then you would roughly be spending £1000 annually simply travelling to and from work. Continuing on, assuming that everyone living in cities and towns is able to walk/cycle is ableist, as many people have health conditions that may not allow them to walk for long periods of time, or even at all. Currently there are 1.2 million wheelchair users in the UK alone, so this assumption is incorrect, and also is an incredibly selfish outlook. This is not to mention the fact that if Boris Johnson then expects people with disabilities to use public transport, he will be blatantly ignoring the physical difficulties with getting on and off the vehicle.

Despite all of this, if the Parliament decide to go through with the 'Ten Point Plan', then a counter solution could be put into place: even if all petrol and diesel cars are banned, lowering the price of public transport would make travel that little bit easier for the average person, and for people who may be unable to make changes in their schedule. Ultimately, towns and cities have higher employment rates, so while it would make sense to allow all types of vehicles in these areas, if the plan really does follow through, then people simply will find new, accessible jobs – resulting in the failure of our economy.


Cars are an essential part of living, especially in towns and cities. As technology advances and the population grows, we cannot expect everyone to suddenly drop their current means of transportation


and buy into another vehicle. Overall it might be much more effective if the Government implemented safer and more environmentally friendly means of public transportation.




Boris Johnson posing for photographs with a branded electric taxi





BRILLIANT BOOK REVIEWS




"How To Change Everything"

making a big difference to people and environments around the world. It highlights many things that most people - and especially young people- don't know that could be caused by Global Warming.




"The Soup Movement"

£250 which was all donated to the same cause. The race began at around 3.30 and the fastest first lap was completed at 3.32. "It's actually quite difficult" said Harry Gower, Year 7, after his first lap.


