

Question 6 – Why is Xmas short for Christmas?


Most people are counting down to next Christmas the moment that Christmas is over. 25th December is a very important date to many people around the world.

Dead Poets Society by Nancy H. Kleinbaum



An Interview with Theresa Lola

When poet Theresa Lola visited our school on 9th November, we couldn't resist the opportunity to interview her and find out more about her life as a poet. Theresa Lola is a British Nigerian poet and writer, who was appointed the Young People's Laureate for London in the year 2019–2020. She holds a Masters in Creative Writing from the University of Oxford, and was awarded the Brunel International African Poetry Prize. Ironically, for her university applications she had three different personal statements as she wasn't sure on what she wanted to study, but none of these were related to poetry. Her first personal statement was in Accounting and Finance, and this is what she ended up studying. The second was Biochemistry, as she had done Maths, Physics, and Chemistry A-Levels, and the third was Optometry because her mum is an eye doctor and that was where she did her work experience. Theresa says to all students at Meopham: "You're lucky that you are meeting a poet and have a school magazine. I didn't realise my potential as a creative. I didn't realise I could make a living as a writer."

Growing up Theresa was quiet: she enjoyed observing people and what they do within their relationships with friends and family, and these are frequently appearing themes within her poems. Theresa did not particularly enjoy school life until she reached Sixth Form, where she met her lifelong friends. She recalls that "I was relocating a lot, and went to three secondary schools…a lot of changing. This was also when I started embracing writing." Theresa left Nigeria when she was 13 and she was in a boarding school when she originally started looking into writing. She said to us that: "I only saw my parents once a month, so I had a lot of time on my hands. It started as diary entries and story writing. When you're in boarding school, you get to observe people, you get to imagine things and see people interacting.

In reference to her inspiration, Theresa explained how her poem *Sing With Me* And Do Not Die With Thirst is taken from a Kendrick Lamar song title; the poem itself reflects on the power music has and how it impacts people's lives. A lot of Theresa's poems are about music, however she also finds inspiration from the everyday. In an exercise with the Year 12 English Literature lesson, Theresa got students to pick an object in the room and describe it in a few words: examples from the students themselves were "audio-sharers" for speakers and "information-grabbers" for phones.

As a professional poet, Theresa said that some poems can be written in a day, whereas some she struggles to write, the longest taking a couple of months: "I trained my muscles and know how to write for a brief, like for Selfridges. Brands want to do things really quickly, Selfridges said 'we have two weeks' and we came to Kent to film. It was very intense and fast-moving. I only had a week to write and get it approved, alongside meetings."

Theresa herself not only writes poems, but also finds enjoyment in putting on performances and collaborations. She particularly enjoys working with people in other genres. "I did a joint performance piece with another poet Rishini, he plays as an actor and we worked on a performance. More recently I worked with a film director, who was also a poet, on a short film. I like working with people from other art forms. Last year, with a fashion designer, I wrote a poetic short film that premiered at London Fashion Week."

Another example of Theresa working with another art form her collaboration with Vogue. "I had an email out of the blue saying 'we're doing a special issue' and they wanted to photograph an older and younger poet and how they were working together. I felt like a model for the day.". The issue she was in was edited by Edwin Enfor, and guest edited by Meghan Markle!

It's your first day of school, You arrive with a smile. You sit in the hall and you're quiet for awhile.


Once it's done and you've met the staff. You go to your lessons and you sit down in class.
