Preparing for the launch meant creating a vision for the scheme, then producing leaflets and presentations that shared this with our visitors. Students also took part in listing local companies to be invited and drafting emails that were used to contact businesses from Meopham and the surrounding areas.

The official launch took place after school and was led by Mrs Greenwood and some of our Student Community Leaders, with the support of **Miss Biscombe**. **Otis Hinsley-Kidd**, **Rhys Marshall**, **Lucy Hodges and Zackary Mitchell** represented Year 7, while **Tudor Nechita and Travis Kmita** supported the event representing Year 10.

The launch targeted both business owners and local organisations to share our aim. Our aim is: 'to bring together the local community in a network that benefits all participants, with the school as a central hub of resources and communication. Everybody in our community has something to offer, something to share with others, our students included. We want to give our students the opportunity to contribute to the community and build their character and portfolio for the future at the same time.'

All members of the community that attended the event were extremely enthusiastic about the Scheme and signed up to take part. Local schools, the parish council and the surgery are all keen to be a part of future projects that will benefit our students as well as members of their organisations. We also have interest from businesses in the area to sponsor the Scheme and specific future projects.

The more I read, the more I discover, the more I learn. Knowledge is so important in this day and age. Any fool can google something, but there's no point doing that unless you can understand what you are googling.




Enid Blyton

My early reading centred around Enid Blyton, especially the **Secret Seven** and **Famous Five**. I often think the love I have now for exploring the British countryside comes from reading these stories.

Short, simple but entertaining tales. They created for the 5 year old me, a world I wanted to live in with people I wanted to hang around with. Those are still the things I often look for in a book.

Terry Pratchett

Terry Pratchett's *Discworld* books started out as a parody of fantasy books, but they grew into describing a world that was loosely connected to our planet but not quite. Discworld is a flat planet carried on four giant elephants who stand on the back of a giant turtle swimming through space. The regular characters include a cowardly wizard, witches, a librarian who has turned into an orangutan, a six-foot tall dwarf and a 98-year old barbarian hero. The origins of rock music, marmite, Shakespeare, Greek philosophy, and tourism are all made clear in the funniest way possible.



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Sylvia Plath

The Bell Jar is one of the most remarkable books I have read. It somehow manages to be immensely sad, shocking and uplifting all at the same time as it charts the journey of a girl going into adulthood. The novel deals with some very serious issues and the effects of mental illness on the main character and while there is a kind of happy ending, there is still a cloud hanging over it.

Douglas Adams

A perfectly ordinary man wakes up one day to find his house is about to be demolished for a bypass, his best friend is actually an alien from Betelgeuse and to cap it all, the Earth is about to be demolished for an intergalactic bypass. What's not to love about the fantastic five book trilogy, *The Hitchhiker's Guide to* the Galaxy. It is easily the best story ever to be written after the author slept in a field after a drunken night out.

Douglas Adams is one of the funniest writers I have ever come across. Each book is far too short but to me they make you see perfect sense in an increasingly mad world. And of course, the answer to life, the universe, and everything is obviously 42.







I.R.R. Tolkien






Star Switch by Alesha Dixon Review by Nshira Ansah (Yr7)




Cinderella is Dead by Kalynn Bayron Review by Harriett Pritchard (Yr7)


If you want a book that has drama, death and a book of of mystery, then this is the book for you!




Private Peaceful by Michael Morpurgo Review by Muhammed Ali Qamar (Yr7)

What is a student leader at Meopham?

What kind of activities do student leaders get involved in?

Student leaders do a variety of different roles - some big and some small. Some examples are: going to the village war memorial on Remembrance Day to represent our school, taking part in EcoAfternoons to make the school environment more pleasant and visiting the Gravesham Food Bank with charity donations. Student leaders also welcome new students by giving them a tour of answering school and the Student leaders questions. also consulted on the school uniform forum.

Recognising exhaustion:

Knowing when it's seriously time to stop and take care of yourself

It's hard to recognise when you're mentally exhausted, instead of just "lazy". If you keep overwhelming yourself, you can become both physically and mentally drained, so it's important to know the signs to avoid burnout!

- → you feel self conscious about things you used to be okay with, and are no longer sure if you are good at what you do. Everything feels a bit wrong, blurry and out of place.
- → you frequently feel anxious over-thinking about "doing things", even things you used to enjoy before. With time, the list of things that make you anxious only keeps growing, and your efforts to avoid them start to be no use.
- → you feel "hurried" to do everything, things that should be relaxing make you annoyed, and you have no patience with other people or with your own physical limits which makes your life difficult and demotivates you to do essential tasks and try new things.
- → you frequently feel like your body is heavy, and sore: headaches, migraines, stomach aches or neck pains, are becoming more frequent.
- → your sleep schedule is really messy: you either can't sleep properly when you'd like to, or sleep way too much, resulting in more fatigue over time.
- → you often daydream about running away, abandoning your current life, disappearing from the lives of people you know, being someone else, or imagining yourself in situations that would change your life completely.

If you identify with three or more of these signs, you should take time to carefully analyse the source of your stress and try your best to deal with it in the best possible way. It might be time to take a break from things that occupy your daily life, such as people, activities, or your current lifestyle as a whole.
